Reception and Key Stage 1

- Choose a song from the list in the resource pack. Make up a dance to it.
- Choose a song from the list in the resource pack. Think about how the song made you feel – make some art based on that. It could be a drawing, a collage or a painting. It doesn't need to be a picture of an object or a person, it could be abstract.
- Look at the pictures in the resource pack. Choose one that you like and make a self portrait in the style of that artist.
- Make a collage to celebrate your interests and your personality. Use magazines, fabrics, and photos to create it.
- Make a poster that shows people it's ok to be different.

Key Stage 2

- Choose a song from the list in the resource pack. Make a poster to advertise the song.
- Choose a song from the list in the resource pack. Make up a dance to it.
- Choose a song from the list in the resource pack. Think about how the song made you feel – make some art based on that. It could be a drawing, a collage or a painting. It doesn't need to be a picture of an object or a person, it could be abstract.
- Look at the pictures in the resource pack. Choose one that you like and make a self portrait in the style of that artist.
- Make a comic on the theme of difference you can draw your own boxes or use the template in the resource pack. For example, a comic about a group of friends who are all very different from each other.
- Make a mood board to show your interests and personality you can either use the template in the resource pack or draw your own grid. Think about including pictures, textures and colours.
- Make a placard or a banner that could be used at a Pride march think about including messages that celebrate difference and promote understanding and kindness.



- Make an animation on the theme of celebrating difference.


