We've created this lesson pack to accompany our <u>School & College Role Model videos</u>. This pack could be used to accompany a number of our videos, and encourages students to reflect on LGBTQ+ people's experiences of faith and religion. Lesson plan

Learning objective: To use source materials to gain a deeper understanding of LGBTQ+ people's experiences in relation to religion

Activity	Details	Resources
Introduction (15 min)	Explain to students that you're going to be discussing faith and identity during the session.	StonewallSchool &College
	As a class, agree some ground rules for the session. For example, treating others (including the person on the video) with respect, expressing opinions in a respectful manner, taking part constructively in conversations, etc. Ask students: How might an LGBTQ+ person of faith experience the world differently to a non-religious LGBTQ+ person? Are those differences positive or negative? In groups of 3, challenge students discuss their instinctual answer to the question. Encourage them to explain why they have answered in that way. Explain that you're going to use a range of source materials to help them form an evidence based answer to the question.	Role Model videos Faith PowerPoint Laptops or tablet devices
